






Why WhatsApp?

Yasser from MENA "with 50 students, it's difficult to give them all **feedback** during the online class time. WhatsApp groups are useful for extra support"



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Setting up WhatsApp groups

'broadcast only': only you (the group administrator) can send messages.

'Group settings' \rightarrow 'Send messages' \rightarrow 'Only admins'

share important information with the whole class and their parents when you don't need them to respond.

'separate groups' for each class or within the class. make the conversations easier to manage.





Setting up WhatsApp groups

app \rightarrow Chats \rightarrow New Group \rightarrow add participants.

icon , add a name \rightarrow Create.





Providing input

Send video/text of the week plan

Share **vocabulary** sets everyday (photos, drawings, audio to demonstrate pronunciation)

Replicate **board work** on paper, take pic, share (diagrams, charts, tables, grammar points)

Update students who **missed a class**.

Send home assignments following a lesson

Communicate written instructions and deadlines

Feedback on language errors – find the mistake!

Setting up tasks and activities

Tasks can be based around the **textbook**, or **stand-alone** but linked to the **curriculum**

Daily/regular tasks sent to students

Have a clear focus of language/skill

Make use of the learners' **environment** or surroundings

Receiving work and giving feedback

Set **deadlines** for learners to submit tasks

Make yourself available at **specific times** each day to answer questions.

Ask learners to make **parents** aware when their kids need to use their phones

Ask your learners to have one **notebook** where they do all the work you give them

Ask them to review the language they're learning from their **notebook**


Depending on the task, learners might send you their work using text, an audio file or a photo of work they have done. **Be flexible!**

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



Things to consider.....

Check the links carefully to avoid sharing **inappropriate content**

Keep an **open mind!**. Ask learners and parents for feedback.

Privacy: It's not recommended for teachers to connect directly with younger learners on their mobile phones. You will need to get permission from their parents or caregivers to set up the groups.

Data usage: Some people won't have a lot of data available for the lesson content. Think about how you can share content using only text or small files.

Group rules: Your class' first task can be to agree rules for the group using modals must, mustn't, should, etc.






Why Facebook?

Limited data/Facebook Lite

Laptops/Desktop

Digital citizenship skills



In a nutshell.....



Getting started....

Create a **new account**, specially meant for your lessons

Create a **'closed' group** which is just for your lessons, divide the class into smaller groups and create separate Facebook groups for your learners

Plan how you will use the platform, for what, at what times

Make a short video **introducing** yourself and **explaining** exactly how the lessons will take place and **communicate** what you **expect** from your learners

Providing input

To provide information, explain concepts or set tasks you can use the feature called **Facebook Live**.

You can also **upload** things like recorded stories, listening texts or videos explaining concepts or pronunciation and then set tasks based on these.

If you want to help learners with their reading, you can simply post **text** for them to read or

share links to other reading texts or sources for your learners to access

Setting up tasks and activities

Upload posts with tasks and activities and keep posting one task daily to keep learners **engaged and motivated**.

Set up **quizzes (polls)** at the end of every week to check learning. Post pictures and videos to help learners initiate **discussions**, set tasks around these.

For **speaking** practice, you can get them to upload recorded audio files.

Receiving work and feedback

Set **deadlines** for learners

Set some time aside during the week to conduct a **live session** for questions

Send in answers directly in **your messenger**

For **longer written tasks**, learners can upload images of their written tasks for you to assess.

Encourage learners to maintain **a notebook** to record their learning.

9 Elements of Digital Citizenship



Things to consider.....

Keep **copyright restrictions** in mind while identifying sources

Seek **permission** from parents for learners to use Facebook at dedicated times

Group rules: It's a good idea to agree a few 'do's and don'ts' for the group.

Safeguarding: Facebook recommends that only people over the age of 13 set up their own accounts

Make sure you make the groups **private** too.
