Synchronous vs. Asynchronous teaching

Synchronous teaching happens in real time, you and your learners interact through the same virtual space at the same e.g. Zoom

Asynchronous teaching occurs through online channels without real-time interaction, you and your learners interact but not at the same time e.g. Edmodo

Synchronous vs. Asynchronous teaching?



Synchronous vs. Asynchronous teaching?

There's no 'good' or 'bad' approach. The 'ugly' is when we don't keep an open mind for available options

It's Not Either Or....

Effective remote teaching requires a combination of both synchronous and asynchronous learning.

Why asynchronous platforms?

It promotes **peer collaboration**, outside the confines of a class schedule.

It allows learners to **reach out** for help when they need it.

It allows learners to work with the materials **in depth and as long as needed** before sharing their thoughts with others.

It is a richer, more **personalised** experience overall

Accessing materials, readings, assignments, quizzes and lesson recordings in **a single place** allows learners to explore topics **effectively** and at their **own pace**.

Supported by discussion forums and one-to-one communications, it creates **engagement** and a sense of **community**

It helps learners become more independent/autonomous.

It allows the teacher to pack more into the class and ensure their learners are getting **enough practice. (extending learning)**

When to use asynchronous platforms?

Learners and teacher are located in different time zones, (flexibility)

There is poor internet connectivity where streaming video is impossible, (affordability)

There are very large groups of learners, or when it's hard or impossible to assemble a group at a particular time (practicality)

It's difficult for your learners to keep to a specific schedule due to family issues or disabilities, **(inclusivity)**

Top pedagogic tips for asynchronous teaching

Revisit your syllabus and learning objectives for the term.

Without the benefit of live interaction, it's especially important to communicate

Making time to **set expectations**, provide **clear instructions** and **respond** to learner discussion threads is critical.

Create a comfortable environment: a safe space for learners to ask questions and let off steam, if they're finding some aspects of the course difficult. **A little humor** can go a long way here, too.

Apply (3 Rs): Rules, Routine, Reward

Steer back to the forums/Encourage a group dynamic

Give your learners a push

Set tangible **deadlines** and **check-in points** that will keep everyone on track.

Don't forget to praise learners

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Key consideration when moving to asynchronous:

How and when will you provide feedback?

How will you make lessons accessible and entertaining?

How will you promote higher order thinking? HOT/LOT

How will you divide units into smaller lessons?



Hear from the teachers....

There are a lot of students that have opened up to me on the Edmodo platform and told me things they may not have told me on another platform that was less inviting to more personal conversation. Unlike other platforms, Edmodo can be MORE than just a place for teachers to post assignments– it can be a place that helps facilitate the kinds of personal interactions that students need in their lives– particularly those that come from poverty, those that are introverts, and/or those on the autism spectrum. <u>Mr. Fairfield</u>

You can create a free account on Edmodo by following the below steps:

Go to <u>www.Edmodo.com</u> website and then click sign up button in the top right.

You will find 3 account types, choose the right one for you. -

edmodo





Student Account

For students, class participants, club members, etc.



Parent Account

For parents or guardians

1- Teacher Account:

- You can sign up using your Gmail/Microsoft email address or you need to fill some tabs manually like "Your email address – Password – Confirm password – School code".
- School code: This is optional, you do not need to fill it except if you receive it from your school's admin user.
- Then you need to activate your account by click the link in the verification email that will be sent it to your email address. If you did not find it in the inbox, please check the spam/junk mail section.

Teacher Account can:

- Create and join classes and groups.
- Add student accounts or invite members with a code/link.
- Post to a class or group and like/comment on posts.
- Manage class and group members and moderate posts.
- Create and administer digital assignments and quizzes.
- Share folders for all class or group members.
- Discuss ideas and share resources with other teachers.
- Explore free teaching resources and educational apps.
- Get unlimited file storage in their Library.
- Send message to their students, parents, or and teacher.
- Create a group conversation with multiple students.

Teacher Account cannot:

• Send messages to students they are not connected to through their Classes.

2- Student Account:

- You can sign up using your Gmail/Microsoft email address or you need to fill some tabs manually like "Class or school code Username Email "optional" Password Confirm Password".
- **Class code:** The teacher can send the class code to their students.
- School code: The school's admin can send the school code to their students.

Note: Filling the code is required in order to register.

Student Account can:

- Join a class and group with a private code or invitation.
- Post to a class or group and like/comment on posts.
- Take and submit digital assignments and quizzes.
- Access folders shared by their teacher.
- Explore free learning resources and educational apps.
- Get unlimited file storage in their Backpack.
- Organize tasks and set custom notifications with the Planner.
- Send a direct message to their teacher or parent.

Student Account cannot:

- Create their own classes or groups.
- Post to a class or group if they are set to "read only".
- Send direct messages to other students unless in a group conversation created by the teacher.

3- Parent Account:

- You can sign up using your Gmail/Microsoft email address or you need to fill some tabs manually like "Your phone number with the country code or your email Password".
- Then you need to fill you first and last name.
- Enter the parent code to stay up-to-date on your student's class activities: You can find it on the bottom left corner of the student's profile home page.
- You can add more than one parent code if you have more than one child.

Parent Account can:

- Connect to their student with a private code or invitation.
- View posts created by the teacher or their connected student.
- View upcoming and completed tasks in their student's Planner.
- Connect to more than one student account if they have multiple children using Edmodo.
- Send a direct message to their student's teacher.
- View conversations between their student and teacher.

Parent Account cannot:

- Create their own classes or groups.
- Post to a class or group.
- · Like/comment on posts not directed to parents.
- View posts that are hidden by the teacher.
- Send messages to other students or parents.



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



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Edmodo and AfL (Assessment for Learning)

Edmodo's Quizzes offer a variety of question types (most of which are automatically graded) and allow you to attach images, videos, sound clips, and PDFs, to the questions.

The Quiz results are automatically tallied and you can see at a glance whether any particular concept requires a bit more focus.

You're teaching Gen Z/post millennials

You can use GIFs for: daily check-ins, celebrate success, informally check for understanding.

Your learners can share GIFs to: models their reaction to the end of a novel, explain how they feel about an upcoming test, illustrate their opinion in a debate or discussion.

"I believe GIFs are a great way to express how we feel, which is vital to building classroom culture and positive relationships within the learner community."

Continue your inside **jokes** using memes


Maintain a respectful digital **environment** for discussion






Online safety (recap)

On Edmodo, there is **no direct messaging** between learners

- Do not post group codes publicly
- **Lock** group codes after all learners have joined
- Monitor learner posts
- Use "read-only" status when needed
- Use code of conduct/**Netiquette**


